For more than 41 years, OVWA has sought to professionalize the field of advocacy by ensuring that crime victim advocates receive the highest quality training, technical assistance, access to best practices, and are represented in public policy efforts to improve victim services and uphold victim rights.

It was a dynamic year for OVWA in 2018! Until the fall of 2017, OVWA's success was due to its dedicated members. Since its inception, OVWA has benefitted and thrived from a steady supply of committed professionals willing to accept leadership positions and continuously work to further its mission. In the fall of 2017, OVWA received federal and state grants to open its first state office. This

state office and its staff would transform OVWA from a volunteer run organization to a fully functioning non-profit with the help of its devoted members. It has not all been easy but every minute has been worth it! In one year, OVWA increased membership by 295%, expanded its training and technical assistance program, influenced major public policy that would affect crime victims, redesigned its website and developed a membership database.

OVWA continuously seeks to professionalize the field of advocacy through ethical and performance standards so that survivors can receive consistent victim-centered and trauma-responsive advocacy in the time they need it most.

We are ambitious for the future and see areas of growth in all of our programs. In the coming years, we will continue to expand our training, technical assistance, best practices development and public policy efforts to serve victims and their advocates. OVWA's legacy continues to flourish in this new and exciting era of victim services.

## WHO WE ARE

## **Our Mission:**

To promote access to safety, healing, justice, and financial recovery for Ohio crime victims through meaningful rights and quality services.

**Ohio Victim Witness Association (OVWA)** is a statewide non-profit that began in 1978 as Ohio Association of Victim Witness Divisions. Members consisted of crime victim advocates based out of county prosecutor offices. These advocates realized they could have a more powerful and influential voice together, and made it their mission to improve the rights and services of Ohio crime victims.

These members promoted funding for victim advocacy programs, provided a source of networking for Ohio's crime victim advocates, professionalized the field of advocacy, established best practices for consistent services and addressed public policies relevant to victims and witnesses of all crimes.

#### A National First That Started Crisis Centers

OVWA held annual events during National Crime Victim Rights Week, honoring victims, witnesses and legislators who had worked on important legislation affecting victims and advocates.

It was during this time that OVWA analyzed Ohio's Victim Compensation program expenses. This led to faster administrative-based processes and created the nation's first law permitting property tax levies for victim services. OVWA's successful advocacy and analysis led to the identification of \$2.5 million dollars from "excess" compensation funds to start rape crisis centers.

### **Two Days in May**

OVWA's dedicated efforts also led to Ohio crime victim agencies having access to State Victim Assistance Act (SVAA) funds, and they now have a permanent seat on the Ohio Attorney General's SVAA Advisory Board. Through collaboration with the Ohio Attorney General's Office, OVWA developed the annual statewide victim advocacy conference, Two Days In May, now viewed as essential for advocates.

### **More State and National Progress**

During the 2000s, OVWA led an initiative with the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections (ODRC) to elevate victim services. This initiative led to the Office of Victim Services within ODRC to be independent from the Parole Board. OVWA members also testified on the national level to endorse a U.S. constitutional amendment for victims' rights.

### A 78% Margin That Paved the Way

OVWA has a long history of public policy work. Its members have worked tirelessly and volunteered countless hours to improve systems to be victim-focused.

The most notable of these successes was in 1994 when OVWA's President and Public Policy Committee Chair led the passage of Ohio's first victim rights constitutional amendment. This passed by a 78% margin!

This amendment laid the groundwork for recently expanded victim rights and gave victims and witnesses a much-needed voice in the criminal justice process.

#### **Ohio Advocate Network (OAN)**

One of the pillars of OVWA is the professionalization of the field of victim advocacy. Founded in 1994, OAN developed a registration protocol to benefit victim advocates and allied professionals assisting Ohio crime victims. Acquiring and maintaining a valid OAN Registered Advocate Status attests that an individual has achieved a defined level of experience and knowledge in the victim assistance profession.

OAN later became the framework upon which the National Advocate Credentialing Program (NACP) was formed under the National Organization of Victim Assistance (NOVA). NACP then became the basis for the creation of the U.S. Department of Defense Sexual Assault Advocacy Credentialing Program (D-SAACP).

#### **Ohio Crisis Response Team (OCRT)**

In 1996, OVWA members began OCRT. This volunteer-run organization's mission is to respond to communities in the aftermath of traumatic events by providing crisis intervention, support services and training. All volunteers are NOVA-trained professionals with varying backgrounds and a wealth of knowledge and experience.

When appropriate, OCRT and the National Crisis Response Team will work together when a community's crisis is too extensive. This was the case on September 11th, 2001. OCRT members were called upon to work at the New Jersey Family Assistance Center in the months that followed. Members provided "companion" services to survivors, family members and friends of those lost on 9/11.

This team of professional advocates is simply outstanding and we are so grateful for their services.

## WHAT WE DO

#### **Training**

OVWA offers quarterly four hour in-person trainings for members, webinars, and educational opportunities for non-members throughout the year. OVWA partners with agencies around the state to bring advocates and allied professionals quality trainings from the experts themselves.

OVWA's trainings are approved by the Ohio Advocate Network and meet the requirements of their continuing education guidelines for Registered Advocates. Continuing education credits for social workers, counselors, marriage and family therapists and attorneys is obtained when applicable.

#### **Technical Assistance**

OVWA offers technical assistance to all types of advocates and their organizations. Technical assistance can be provided over the phone, via email, or in-person. Our technical assistance is provided by OVWA staff, its members, state coalitions and experts in the field. It is OVWA's responsibility to connect advocates to improve victim services.

Technical assistance ranges from help developing policies and procedures, mediation with other victim advocacy groups, assistance upholding victim rights, referrals to agencies and organizations, research for information and valid referrals and resources, and guidance for new and long-standing advocacy organizations.

#### **Public Policy**

In keeping with OVWA's history of successful public policy initiatives, OVWA continues to promote public policy that enhances the rights of crime victims and advocate services and promote funding for victim services across Ohio and nationally. For example, OVWA drafted and sought sponsorship for proposed legislation that would become the State Victim Assistance Act (SVAA), establishing a source of funding for victim assistance programs pre-VOCA.

SVAA continues today as a viable source of funding for victim assistance services in the state of Ohio. OVWA has provided proponent testimony in support of victims' rights legislation and successfully assisted in drafting, presenting and passing a Victim Bill of Rights and a Constitutional Amendment for Victims' Rights in Ohio.

Members of OVWA have many times initiated and/or participated in collaborative efforts to establish protocols for prosecutor-based victim assistance, sexual assault examinations and billing, ORC Chapter 2930 and other victim-related statute compliance.

OVWA's work to establish standardized training and continuing education requirements for victim advocacy professionals resulted in the Ohio Advocate Network (one of the few state advocate credentialing programs in the nation) and what became the BASICS Academy, administered by the Ohio Attorney General's Office.

These are but a few examples of the victim service and rights achievements OVWA is proud to have initiated and worked collaboratively to accomplish in the state of Ohio.

#### **Best Practices**

OVWA believes that advocates are only as good as the information they are given. OVWA provides the public with best practices covering a wide array of topics. Whether professionals are a systems-based advocate or a community-based advocate, these resources can provide applicable and current information to improve daily work with victims of crime.

Most recently, OVWA partnered with seven other organizations to develop "Serving Survivors with Disabilities: An Advocate's Guide". This publication has been shared across the state and has influenced how services are provided to survivors. This publication was the first of its kind in Ohio and continues to be a staple for the crime victim advocate.
